The College has a well designed management information system in place to keep track of several sectors of the college. Since 2009, the College has used the tally accounting software to keep track of financial transaction details. For the academic year 20182019, an online admissions system has been implemented. SOUL software version 2.0.0.12 powers the library administration information system. The institutional data entry repository, which allows users to search, issue, and return books, is managed by the library staff. Smart cards, which are given to both students and faculty members, are used to access this information. Through the INFLIBNET nList, we have access to ebooks and ejournals. All students in the Biology department, from F.Y. B.Sc. to M.Sc., have access to a computerised practical selfstudy centre. Maths type and Winedt latex software are used in the Mathematics department for teaching purposes.

1.1 - Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

The Veer Narmad South Gujarat University, Suart, Gujarat, is connected with B.K.M Science College, Valsad, and follows the university's curriculum. Every year, the college develops a strategy to guarantee that the curriculum is adequately executed. The highlights of the roadmap are described below. Prior to the beginning of the academic year, IQAC creates a yearly academic calendar based on the University calendar, outlining available dates for significant activities in order to ensure a healthy teaching-learning process and continuous evaluation. This information is available on the bulletin board. Each department holds a meeting at the start of each academic year to discuss the academic calendar. The practical and theoretical syllabus is assigned by the department chair. Every department develops a teaching plan that assigns topics to be covered each semester. During the academic year, students are provided a syllabus for each course. The timetable committee, which is formed prior to the commencement of the academic year, specifies when theory and practical lessons will take place. Theoretical and practical subjects will be taught using both traditional and sophisticated teaching methods. Instruction is linked with the use of ICT to make the teaching-learning process more learner-centric. ICT, computers, and well-equipped laboratory facilities, among other things, can help students improve their performance. Assignments, Viva-

Voce in practical teaching, seminars, workshops, special lectures by notable academics, educational tours, field trips, and industrial visits are all used to supplement classroom instruction. All of this is done in a methodical manner, with appropriate departments keeping records. All students have the same educational opportunities. Students who are behind in class are encouraged to enroll in remedial classes. The college library provides professors with the resources they need to properly present curriculum. In addition to books and scientific publications, the college library has computers with internet connection, INFLIBNET N-LIST, SOUL-2.0.0.12. The availability of e-books and periodicals improves students' learning capacity. The English Department makes a concerted effort to assist students in improving their communication skills. The college features a NET/SET cell that offers NET/SET examination tutoring. Faculty members have access to INFLIBINET, which provides full-text e-books and e-journals to them. The English Department makes a concerted effort to assist students in improving their communication skills. Faculty members have access to INFLIBINET, which provides full-text electronic books and journals. Aside from the main library, certain departments have built departmental libraries to assist students in gaining a deeper understanding. Internal exams, such as class tests, mid-term assessments, and so on, are used to see if students have learnt the material in accordance with the curriculum's goals. Exams are scheduled according to the academic calendar on a regular basis. Each subject's assignments are sent to all students prior to the internal exams. Remedial classes are available for lethargic students. Regular attendance, mark lists, and student growth are kept and retained by the representative departments. The educational programme here aims to give students with a strong foundation in their core subjects, as well as the necessary skills and moral principles for personal achievement and meaningful participation in society.

Formal mentoring system is yet to be implemented in all departments of the college. However, the faculty members maintain close rapport with the students (especially the students from the major course) and assist them in various aspects pertaining to their career and personal issues. The Academic tours and field works that are carried on in some of the departments is a good opportunity for the students and the faculty members for developing good personal bonds as good of time is spent together during travelling and overnight stays in outstation places. The close bonding between the teachers and the taught also gets developed through a variety of co curricular and extracurricular activities in different departments, This way, faculty members get to know about their personal traits and also the opportunity to perform the role as their informal mentors. However, a few departments like physics, chemistry and statistics has been implementing the formal mentoring practice, primarily for the major course students. • To keep a track of performance students, college conduct internal test following the schedule prepared by the principal. Apart from the test, practice assignments are also to give to the students. All teacher maintains attendance sheet. • All teacher maintains a record of attendance sheet, assignments, performance test. • Teachers conduct remedial classes for slow learners. Need based remedial classes have proved to be beneficial to the students. • All teachers guide the students in conducting co curricular and extracurricular activities. • Mentoring enhances students' academic performance and attendance and also helped our students to organize and execute co curricular activities, learn to solve problems in real life situations. • Helped to mould the personality of the students. • Advanced learners identified and encouraged with incentive prizes.

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2.5.2 - Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

Being affiliated to Veer Narmad South Gujarat University Surat, the college follows the Internal evaluation structure as recommended by the university. At present, semester system for all levels and all faculties has been implemented by the university. Keeping in view the need for continuous formative assessment of the students, the college initiated the following measures: •Centralized Internal Examination system is followed for smooth working and transparency. • Each year, the college constitutes an examination committee to ensure effective implementation of all activities related to internal and external examinations and assessments. • Home assignments, seminars, general behavior and attendance are taken into consideration while awarding internal scores to the students. For the students of science faculty, journal keeping of the practical sessions is also considered for continuous assessment. • Grievances in Internal Exam, if any, are resolved through interaction. • Retest is conducted for those students who remain absent during the internal examinations owing to their participation in NCC, NSS, Sports, or other camps as to facilitate continuation of their studies without hindrance. • The results of the internal examinations are declared a week, enabling the students to raise any grievance and get it resolved before the marks are finally submitted to the university. In addition to the internal test, for continuous internal evaluation of the students, Practical Viva-Voce, assignments and seminars are introduced. Students are encouraged to participate in Quiz contests, Poster competitions and conferences. Remedial classes are conducted for the slow learners, long absentees and the students who participated in Sports, NSS, NCC, Saptdhara activities etc. The college has also set an eligibility criteria for students to take up the internal exams. Students complaints are often communicated to institutional and department authorities. They have their own technique for acquiring data in a discrete manner, whether directly or indirectly. The principle has a separate suggestion box that he checks on a regular basis. Students have complete freedom of expression. As a result, were learning a lot about the strengths and shortcomings of the teachers. A concerned educator is recommended in this circumstance. This is a non-formal way of internal evaluation that is regularly employed. CC cameras are used to keep track of both personnel and students actions. Infrastructure evaluations are also done on a regular basis by students. On a regular basis, internal reviews of fundamental amenities are carried out. The complaints of students are addressed by the appropriate authorities. Students are provided an IQAC-created feedback format that includes all of the details concerning a teachers performance. The information obtained is compiled, evaluated, and analyzed by the committee. Actions are being done to correct the situation. Concerned faculties are individually contacted and confidentially informed of the outcomes of the internal examination. At any time, students are free to contact the HOD, mentor, or principle.

Veer Narmad the college is affiliated with South Gujarat University in Surat. Every year, we develop an Academic Calendar based on the Universitys calendar. The heads of all departments meet with the relevant departmental faculty members at the start of each academic year. Teaching faculties are assigned based on exams, assignments, and other forms of evaluation. The meeting goes over the academic years draught plan, which includes, among other things, assignment collection, internal examinations and evaluations, journal preparation, practical viva and certification, co-curricular and extracurricular activities, celebration of Various Days, and invited talks by eminent people. The leaders of all departments review the development of the problem on a regular basis and take appropriate measures.

procedure for both is to decide the priority needs at the Institute. Accordingly, quotations are invited and the best service provider is chosen depending on rates and services. The Institution makes adequate arrangements for the maintenance and for better change of the college infrastructure. The management ensures that enough UGC grants and funds are allocated and utilized for the maintenance. We have a committee to ensure optimum allocation and utilization of available finance. It functions in the following manner. There is a strict policy to promote licensed vendors and equipment. The policy is also of inviting minimum three quotations. There is a policy to buy sophisticated instrument from Government approved suppliers only. The institution takes the suggestions and complaints from the students and staff members. The committee classifies it on the basis of requirements and then it is forwarded to the head of the institution. The head of the institution solves the problem by making suggestion to the responsible person. It is then analyzed appropriately. Financial aid is released according to the requirement. Tenders from different agencies are invited, compared and selected on the basis of cost effective quality work. There after the order is placed. Routine cleaning of the laboratory, library, sports complex, classrooms etc. is done by the departmental peons of the college. The college library also has computers with internet access, INFLIBNET N-LIST, and SOUL-2.0.0.12., in addition to books and scientific publications. Students can access e-books and periodicals, which is a valuable resource and maintain by Librarian The support facilities like replenishing of consumables like laser printer toners, photocopying machine toners, laboratory chemicals, stationary items etc. are also made available through pre- authorised vendors. The college boasts of a vast green cover of trees and lawns. This also means that the areas under green cover will have a lot of leaves and twigs falling from trees and shrubs. The Sweeper maintains the campus clean. By participating in personal relationships with employees during meetings, management encourages them to give their all in their teaching obligations. The authority of management and executive members are always accessible to assist us in the Institutes overall development. They promote and approve funds for the colleges numerous development initiatives. They also give freely in the form of awards and recognition to qualifying applicant The college pursues decentralisation and democratic administration by organising Institution level committees and delegating work to varied committee members. Each committee is led by a convener and a few members under the Principals presidency. 1. The college has made numerous efforts to fulfil this goal from time to time. These programmes were made possible through college financing. 2.An Eco-Club was formed to aid in the greening of the environment. 3.A solar water heater has been installed at the hostel. 4.A windmill has been installed at the Botanical Garden. 5.To limit the amount of energy required by bulbs and fans, college architectural design emphasises the use of natural lighting and ventilation. 6. Energy conservation awareness has been developed among employees and students. 7. Energy-saving notices/posters are put throughout each department in key areas. 8. Energy-saving lighting is employed. 9. Only when absolutely essential, lights, fans, computers, and laptops are turned on. In instructional rooms and practical labs where natural light is sufficient, lights are not turned on. The existing air conditioning, computers, printers, copiers, and other equipment are all turned off when not in use. 10.Any dripping faucets are repaired as soon as possible. 11. Students council and faculty members have been given the task of preventing energy waste by ensuring that fans and lights are not turned on in vacant classrooms or laboratories. 12. Yes, rainwater harvesting is implemented in the Botanical Garden by building a small pond, and rainwater is also used to recharge the well to boost ground water levels. 13. Rainwater is collected by the Chemistry Department and used as distilled water in the Chemistry Laboratory. 14. While the activity does not take place on campus, the NSS unit builds check dams/boribandh and a special dam for irrigation in hilly areas in the Dharampur district. The institutions Biology Department has constructed and maintains a gorgeous garden. The garden and tree plantings serve to reduce carbon dioxide levels in the atmosphere by providing oxygen. The College campus is carbon neutral thanks to the Agronomy experimental farm, orchards garden, and tree plantations. Printing is done on both sides of the paper. We want students to start writing their answers on the first page of both internal and external assessments, and to use all of the papers without avoiding lines. Old print papers are used as a note-paper. Departmental notices and information are sent via email/SMS. All documents are thoroughly edited prior to printing. The use of plastic is strongly discouraged. Students are encouraged to ride their bikes or take public transportation to class. b We have a day called No Vehicle Day that is dedicated to this type of activities. Outside the colleges main gate, there is parking for vehicles and scooters. Blank paper from journal assignments and internal exam extra exams is repurposed into rough paper, lowering blank paper usage. One pertinent reason is that the use of candle now has not been confined only for devotional purpose or somes pecial occasion. They are now a part of every single moment, special or routine. They add a touch of warmth in the occasion and that makes it largely popular. AIM AND OBJECTIVE OF THE PRACTICE: Small scale industries like candle making can create a lot of employment opportunities, especially in rural areas where globalization may not have totally permeated. A lot of small industries are owned and operated by the women, this gives a very handy push to women empowerment, too. Small scale sector can stimulate economic activity and is entrusted with the responsibility of realizing the following objectives: To create more Employment Opportunities with Less Investment. To uplift the backward class of rural as well as urban areas. To mobilize and ensure optimum utilization of unexploited resources of the country. To ensure equitable distribution of income and wealth. To provide employment. To attain selfreliance. To adopt latest technology aimed at producing better quality product at lower costs. THE CONTEXT: Keeping this view in mind and to explore the creative Scientific potentials in the young mind of the students, the Chemistry Department of B. K. M. Science College, had organized three days workshop on "Candle Making" during 05-09-2018 to 07-09-2018. There were total registration of 72 students and among them there were total 36 boys and 36 girls and they were divided into seven batches. Through this the students have learnt the different usages of candle to illuminate the place and to make it beautiful. By this small training they will have idea about Gruh Udyog and with that they can manage their survival. BEST PRACTICE - 2 TITLE OF THE PRACTICE: Agarbatti (Incense Stick) Making Incense sticks also called agarbattis are fragranced sticks used from ancient period by people all over the world. The evolution of incense stick could be from the burning of aromatic woods in the primitive period. As mankind gained civilization and became more religious, these fragranced agarbattis played important role in daily rituals. Agarbatti is an Indian Hindi terminology which is otherwise popularly known worldwide as 'Incense Sticks' and as the name itself suggests, they are thin bamboo sticks of about 8" to 12" length coated with paste of fragrance of natural ingredients extracts of scented flowers or majorly forest yield. Agarbattis have huge potential as a manufacturing business because its demand is at all-time high and go even higher during festivals. More than 90 countries use Agarbattis and India is the sole producer of these Incense Sticks that caters to the demands of the people. OBJECTIVE OF THE PRACTICE: To increase employment opportunities while reducing investment. To alleviate rural and underdeveloped economies economic backwardness. To alleviate regional inequity. To organize and ensure the best possible use of the countrys untapped resources. To raise peoples living standards. To ensure that income and riches are distributed fairly. To address the issue of unemployment. To achieve self-sufficiency. To use the most up-to-date technology in order to provide a higher-quality THE CONTEXT: In order to explore the creative Scientific potentials in the young minds of the students, the Chemistry Department of B.K.M.Science College held a three-day workshop on Agarbatti (Incense Stick) Making from January 23 to January 25, 2019. This session drew a total of 78 pupils (22 boys and 56 girls). All of the pupils were divided into eight groups. Mr. Durgesh A. Parekh, proprietor of Agarbatti Industries, led the training programme. He discussed about the fully automatic incense stick machine, its cost, and benefits, as well as Agarbatti Premix Powder and the use of bamboo sticks. THE PRACTICE: DATE: 23/01/2019 to

The basic ingredients of an incense sticks are bamboo sticks, paste which is generally made of charcoal dust or sawdust and joss/jiggit/gum/tabu powder- an adhesive made from the bark of litsea glutinosa and other trees and the perfume ingredients are added to make it pleasant. The success of the training was that the institution has made the students aware about the making of incense, to visit the factory so that they can have live experience on a large scale and enable them to think over small scale business,
